Invitation

The World Congress on Family Law and Children's Rights will be convened for the sixth time in Sydney Australia between 17 and 20 March 2013.

This Congress, which has been convened every four years since its inauguration in 1993, has travelled to three destinations in the Northern Hemisphere; the United States of America, Canada and the United Kingdom and has been held in Australia and South Africa.

In 2013 it returns to Sydney Australia where it all began.

The Congress, which was a lawyers' initiative, has drawn as its delegates not only members of the legal profession and the judiciary but also academics, members of the medical and health sciences and helping professions, politicians and policy makers, indigenous representatives and members of the public concerned with the protection of children, the advancement of their welfare and the upholding of their human rights.

The Congress is a major international human rights event focussing on children and on Family Law.

The Congress examines the responses of States and individuals to the needs of children for their protection and the advancement of their rights recognised in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and given effect to in metropolitan and international law and practice. It seeks out solutions to the problems for children found in the abrogation of those rights. The Sixth World Congress has taken as its theme "Building Bridges: From Principle to Reality". It will examine where those bridges have both failed and succeeded in bringing a real and lasting benefit to those for whom UNCROC was crafted. The Congress will examine the performance of those States who have given expression to UNCROC in their laws and in the adoption of international multilateral and bi lateral treaties. In addition, in a world of highly mobile families, the Congress will give attention to the ways in which Family Law meets the various needs of families in whatever form from different cultures, in order to provide a structure which can effectively and justly provide for its members who are the subject of relationship breakdown.

The strength of the Congress has always been its delegates. This Congress has been fortunate in attracting key speakers and contributors from around the world from different cultures and different disciplines. Its resolutions flowing from its considerations are important statements for those with the power to change and set right what is wrong. The Congress has been fortunate in that many of its resolutions have, following their publication, seen changed perspective or policy. The Congress is able to be an important voice amongst others for productive and constructive change.

We look forward to your participation in this event and to meeting you in Sydney. Delegates will demonstrate by their attendance their commitment to not only making the world a better place for all of us, but also one in which future generations cannot accuse this generation of standing mute whilst evil triumphs.





Sydney - Your Host City

Sydney is the Gateway City to Australia and home to the world's most beautiful harbour. Life in Sydney revolves around its spectacular harbour, its golden beaches, parklands and national parks. Visitors soon fall in love with the attractions, experiences and atmosphere. It is a cosmopolitan, stylish city with a reputation for being friendly, clean and vibrant. Attractions include world class art galleries, museums, parks, waterways that stretch into all parts of the city, wildlife parks, the majestic sails of the Sydney Opera House, luxury cruises, aquariums, beaches, The Royal Botanic Gardens, theatre, entertainment, shopping, culture and sport

Arriving in Sydney

Sydney Kingsford Smith Airport is the busiest and most significant commercial airport in Australia and is a primary hub for international flights from around the globe. Both direct international and domestic flights arrive and depart from this airport.

Sydney Airport is located 10km from Sydney's central business district and approximately 20 minutes drive by car. Transfers to the city from the airport are easily accessed. Taxis are available outside the terminal at at a cost of approximately AUD25.00. Alternatively, Sydney's airport train, AirportLink offers a fast and direct link from the airport to the CBD.

Banks

Banks in Australia are open from 09:30 – 16:00 Monday to Thursday and from 09:30 – 17:00 on Fridays. Most banks are closed weekends and public holidays. Automatic Teller Machines are open 24 hours and are located throughout the city and surrounds. Facilities for exchange of currency are available at the airport, larger hotels and banks.

Car Parking

There is one car park available for congress delegates and visitors to the Sydney Convention and Exhibition Centre. The Sydney Exhibition Centre Car Park is located off Darling Drive, underneath the Centre's five exhibition halls, in Darling Harbour. The car park provides direct access to the Centre and the Darling Harbor precinct. The car park features 18 disabled parking spaces and access to the Centre can also be gained via ramps and lifts. The car park is open 24 hours, Monday to Sunday. Car parking is not included in the Congress registration fee.

Car Rental

Cars can be rented in Australia from local or international companies. Average cost per day for a medium sized car is AUD70.00. All cars are right- hand drive.

Climate

Delegates can expect mainly fine weather in March with average temperatures ranging from 17 - 24°C.

Credit cards

Credit cards are widely accepted. Commonly recognised cards include Visa, MasterCard, American Express. Only these cards are accepted by the Congress.

Currency exchange

Decimal currency is used in Australia (AUD) and currency units are dollars and cents. Australian notes are: AUD100, AUD50, AUD20, AUD10, AUD5. Coins are: AUD2, AUD1, AUD .50, AUD.20, AUD.10, AUD.05 cents

Disabled Facilities

If you require disability specific facilities, please notify the Congress Organiser by indicating on your registration form.

Electricity

The electrical supply is 240 volts, 50 Hz. The connection for appliances is a flat 3-pin plug. Most city hotels provide 110 volts for shavers.

Health

Vaccinations are not required unless you have come from a yellow fever-infected country zone within six days prior to your arrival. You do not need any other health certificate to enter Australia. Australia has a high standard of hygiene and doctors and dentists are highly trained and hospitals are well equipped. In the event of illness, hotel staff can arrange a doctor for you.

Insurance

It is strongly recommended that delegates take out adequate travel and health insurance prior to commencement of travel. Further information can be obtained from your travel agent.

Name Badges

Delegate name badges are mandatory and will be required for admission to all sessions, the exhibition and social functions included in the registration fee.

No Smoking Policy

Official Language

The official language of the Congress is English.

Passport and Visa

All international visitors require a valid passport and Visa for entry into Australia (New Zealand visitors require a valid passport only). A facility for electronically issuing visas, The Electronic Travel Authority (ETA) system, is currently available through international travel agents and airlines in 29 countries including the US, UK, parts of Western Europe, Singapore, Japan, Hong Kong and Taiwan. This system also includes pre-clearance for entry which reduces the time needed to process passengers on arrival. Your local Australian Embassy or Consulate can advise of the availability. For non-ETA countries, visas are issued from Australian Embassies and Consulates around the world and we recommend that you apply early for your visa.

Quarantine

Australia is free from many plant and animal diseases prevalent in other countries. Very strict quarantine rules apply to the importation of animals and plants which cannot be brought into the country without prior application. Animal and plant products are also restricted. Tax

Australia applies a tax to the purchase of both goods and services called the Goods and Services Tax (GST). The rate of tax that applies to taxable products and services is 10%.

Time Zones

Sydney operates on Australian Eastern Summer Time in March. For international passengers, we suggest that you try to allow yourself at least a day in which to adjust to the time difference and relax after your flight, before the Congress commences. Travellers flying westward across the Pacific Ocean are reminded that they will lose a day by crossing the International Date Line. The 'lost day' will be regained on the return journey.

Tipping

Tipping is not as widespread or regulated in Australia as it is in other parts of the world. Tipping is your prerogative, a reward for service. It is customary to tip hotel porters, and a gratuity of about 10% is usual in restaurants if good service is received. NO service charge is added to hotel or restaurant bill.
